Key Knowledge

- Describe the differences between a city, town and village.
- Use a map to follow a prepared route.
- Recognise human and physical features on aerial photographs.
- Ask and answer questions about human and physical features of Felpham.
- Collect, present and ask questions about data through a survey of Felpham Beach
